



If you've taken a glance at the schedule, you know that 1976 is going to be a most demanding season for the Squires. Our slightly insane business manager has the corps in many highly competitive shows that will require much travelling.



The corps will be a bit bigger than last years. The music will be a bit more sophisticated and the whole program will be more finely integrated; making for a most pleasing on-field presentation.

The corps itself is a unique montage of kids and young adults from about every walk of life imaginative . . . from those stepping out of the Pages at the 6th or 7th grade level, right up through people in their final season as they appraoch the 21 year old limit. The Squires have a solid inner core of kids from the Schuyler County area that has made the unit a strong one in its growth. And just as gratifying, the community and kids were open when other youngsters from outside the immediate area wanted the opportunity to march with a unit that was on the move. These people were accepted and today we have a drum corps that represents what drum corps should be all about . . . all members accepting each other as friends working towards a common end of competitive excellence.

From the Business Manager's End

The 1976 competition schedule is the most demanding in the Squires 12 year history. The corps will be on the field much earlier, do more travelling, and will be spending more time in head to head shows with the world's finest drum and bugle corps.

For the layman looking at the schedule, let me take a moment to explain the rationale behind its design. Considerations include: 1) prize money possibilities 2) level of competition with respect to exposure 3) level of judging with respect to obtaining good, helpful critiques that the instructors can use in improving the corps 4) realistic travel expenses and mileage 5) ability of members and staff to make all functions while still attempting to lead as normal a life as a true drum corps nut can.

The Squires are at a pivotal point right now, with the ultimate goal of the '76 season being cracking into that top 12 of the DCI. (The corps narrowly missed that honor last season by finishing 13th, just 6 of a point behind the legendary Casper Troopers.) The schedule is structured so that the corps is in peak form by the time the Championships roll around in late August.

The season will not be easy. The entire drum corps world, especially the east coast is the strongest it has been in recent history. The Squires will be spending a much greater percentage of the summer on the road in competition with the "giants" . . . the Madison Scouts, Santa Clara Vanguard, Chicago Caveliers Racine Kilties . . . and so on. These are names that even many old drum corps buffs from many moons ago find familiar.

And that's what makes the coming summer so remarkable. A home spun drum corps with a strong and vital nucleous from a small, rural town of 2,800 in upstate New York in the thick of the best drum corps competition. A drum corps that has worked incredibly hard to move from dead last in the state to become the champs last year. A drum corps that has a tight group of kids putting in an immense amount of time in working toward a common goal. This is what's great about going into the '76 season.

It will be demanding. To the parents, we ask for your understanding and help, as we have always had in year's past. To friends and fans, don't become discouraged if you don't hear of quite as many first places or high caption awards. The bulk of our battles are in the major leagues now, but the possibilities for greater accomplishments exist.

To everyone, our sincere thanks for helping the Squires get to this point. We look for your most needed continued support throughout the season of '76. If at anytime anyone desires any information about the corps, please do not hesitate to get ahold of me.



Squires Repetoire 1976

Off the line Moorside March

This piece was originally written for band by the British composer, Gustav Holst. Holst was perhaps one of the earliest composers to write for the concert band as we know it and his works have become standard repetoire for the modern concert band.

The forceful scoring for brasses and overall martial style make much of Holst's work readily adaptable to today's drum and bugle corps. Moorside March is perhaps the prime example of this characteristic. The introduction consists of thematic material from the original score while the ending has also been redeveloped to provide more effective coordination of drill and musical aspects.

Production Polovetsian Dance #2

by Alexander Borodin

Without a doubt the technically most demanding portion of the repetoire, the Polovestsian Dance provides a daring and exciting production. The opening theme (originally a clarinet solo in the orchestral score) is introduced by the soprano section while the baritones provide an ostinato figure. The second theme, a more lyrical melodic theme; than appears in the middle section while the sopranos repeat the opening rhythmic motive. Finally the baritones and brasses combine playing the melodic motive while the upper voices execute the opening theme in an altered form bringing the corps to concert formation.

Concert Anitra's Dance, from Peer Gynt Suite by Edvard Grieg

Another selection from the orchestral repetoire, this rendition is fashioned after an arrangement for jazz band. Sammy Nestico, noted jazz arranger and professor at North Texas State University, included this and a number of traditional tunes and short orchestral pieces as the basis for a series of arrangements for an album entitled "Swingphonic Sounds." The recording was made by the N. T. State Jazz Lab Band and also includes last years concert "London Bridge."

Color Presentation National Emblem E.E. Bagley

Tradtionally one of America's favorite marches the National serves fittingly as a color presentation in our Bicentennial year. The march opens in the traditional style with a brazen introduction, followed by a change of tempo and style to a light jazz swing. The swing is followed by a brief percussion interlude in the original tempo leasing to a rousing finale featuring the soprano section in a rapid tongueing passage accompanied by a running counter melodic figure in the mellophones and full chordal structure in the baritones and basses.

Exit I Write the Song

Barry Manilowe

Barry Manilowe, while being best known for his popular songwriting, has also been very successful in the commercial music field. He has written "jingles" and background or theme music for numerous television advertisements. A very recent entry to popular music's "top 40," "I Write the Song" is a pleasant blend of excitement, emotion, and musicality.
